Plant of the Month

*C*rown Lilies (*Daubenya*)

Daubenya is a genus of bulbous flowering

plants in the Hyacinthaceae family from South Africa. Each bulb produces only two leaves, which appear with the flowers and normally spread out along the

ground on either side. Individual flowers are white, pink, yellow or red Flowers are pollinated by butterflies, beetles, sunbirds, and bees depending on the species.

Daubenya aurea used to be the only species in the genus, but more recently



added to give a total now of eight different ones.

Gardening in June

It's time to.....

- Clean and sharpen secateurs, saws and hedge shears so they are in top shape for winter pruning.
- Transplant decidious trees, roses and shrubs after their leaves have fallen.
- Mist-spray your indoor plants regularly to ensure they don't become dehydrated by winter heating.
- Any spring bulbs that have not been planted must go in-even if they have already sprouted.
- Spread a dry mulch around growing bulbs and water every couple of weeks with liquid plant food or worm 'juice'.

Leaf an Impression!!



Want to brighten up your garden without planting annuals? Try heucheras with their colourful foliage, dainty flower spikes and are fuss free. They are frost hardy and will grow in a wide range of conditions including full sun, shade, heat and humidity. They also grow beautifully in pots.

In the Vegie Patch.

You can plant snow peas, broad beans and radish seeds. You still have time to plant cabbage, lettuce, spinach and kale seedlings.

Grow micro greens.



Even if you don't have room in your garden for food crops you can grow healthy microgreens on an indoor window sill. They grow quite easily from seed. Try mustard, coriander, bean sprouts or cress seeds. You will be harvesting within two weeks of planting.

Plant bulbs in spring in poor, free draining soil – ideal for a rockery or near a southwest facing wall for wind protection. They are the ultimate source of low maintenance Autumn/Winter colour.
