Blue Muriel – Water Lily

Stunning pale powder blue flowers, becoming tipped with pink as flower ages. Leaves are green to bronze, with purple edges and specks.

Rosa 'Muriel'

Muriel' is a bushy, deciduous shrub with thorny stems bearing pinnate leaves divided into semiglossy, toothed, mid-



green leaflets and clusters of lightly fragrant, double, pink flowers from late spring into autumn

Muriel Fuchsia

Semi-double bluishmagenta corolla with
sepals of scarlet. Blooms
in early Summer to early
Autumn. This fuchsia has
oval, green leaves and
produces fruit that is
edible but not appetizing.
These are very versatile plants, they can be
trained to baskets, trees, espaliers, pillars,
and trellises. Fuchsias thrive in a temperate
climate with moisture or humidity.

Plant of the Month

Calibrachoa



While Calibrachoa million bells may be a fairly new species, this dazzling little plant is a must-have in the garden. Its name comes from the fact that it features hundreds of small, bell-like flowers that resemble miniature petunias. Its trailing habit makes it perfect for use in hanging baskets, containers or as a small area ground cover.

Introduced in the early 1990s, all cultivars of Calibrachoa are hybrids with the original species native to South America

They prefer to be grown in moist but well-drained, organically rich soil in full sun. They do not tolerate high pH soils, though the plants will take very light shade and may tolerate some drought. In fact, plants with some shade will survive longer into the summer months, especially in warmer regions.

Eriostemon or Native Daphne. Hope it fares better than my Lavender that gave it away in the wet!


Even if you're not in the market for a new native, it's a lovey place to wander around, have a coffee or just a chat with Luke. He's a friendly bloke.

Berrima Museum Exhibition Reopening

The Berrima District Museum will reopen on 4 March, 2022 featuring a new digital exhibition entitled *Gardens and Landscapes of the Southern Highlands - Then and Now.*

This is an amazing history of private and public gardens as well as commercial gardens over the past almost 200 years. Historical landscapes have been captured in digital displays of artwork as well as in digital displays of early photographs of the Bundanoon Gullies dating from C1890 and a Bundanoon garden before and after the bushfires of January 2020.

There are 10 TV screens as well as glass-cabinets and wall mounted displays. These feature several very old Bowral gardens and their history (Retford Park, Hopewood House and Milton Park) as well as other local gardens (Fifth Chapter, Upper Woodlands, Highdown and Chinoiserie). The redevelopment of Bangala (an inter-war homier Bowral) and Yarrabin (which was saved from demolition) provide insight into the efforts local people have undergone to "rescue" old homes in Bowral. In the glass cabinets are a variety of displays, including works by Louisa Atkinson, her granddaughter Janet Cosh and Elaine Musgrave (an internationally well known botanical artist), some old garden award trophies and a collection of old Tulip Time brochures.

The Museum will be open on Friday, Saturday and Sunday from 10am-4pm only but private group visits, of four to eight people, can be arranged by contacting Bud Townsing, the curator/coordinator of the exhibition by email (metow@bigpond.com) or his mobile (0429 030 195).

Grand Pacific Drive is a scenic coastal drive passing through lush rainforests, over the Sea Cliff Bridge and passing through the coastal townships of Wollongong, Shellharbour, Kiama and the Shoalhaven region. The 665 metre long Sea Cliff Bridge is a highlight of the Grand Pacific Drive





Wollongong Botanic Garden has a range of varied collections or groups of plants. Each collection includes plants either similar to each other, or would naturally live together and includes an Azalea Bank, flowering trees and shrubs, roses, a woodland garden as well as a Japanese tea house and a rotunda overlooking the duck pond. A beautiful Tudor Manor-style house, Gleniffer Brae, is also located within the Botanic Garden. Built in 1938, it was originally the family home of Arthur Sidney Hoskins, who established the steel making industry in Wollongong. The garden around the house was designed by renowned 20th Century landscaper Paul Sorensen.

Merribee garden spans seven acres and features 2km of pathways. Wander through formal garden rooms, including the Rose Garden, the hedged Potager, the walled Snow Pear Garden, the Cottage Garden, Crepe Myrtle Walk, the Herb Garden, the Lavender Paddock, the Bunya Bunya Copse and finish up at the adjoining hedging, topiary and rose nursery. Birdlife is vibrant in the garden. In the orchard edible fruit ranges from mango, guava and apple to pomegranate, passionfruit and avocados. The garden is also home to beehives that yield Merribee honey

- With the exception of Floral Art classes 29-32, all entries must come from plants which have been cultivated by the exhibitor for at least three months.
- 2. All entries, except Classes 16, 17, 18, 23, 24, 27 and Floral Art should be exhibited in green exhibition vases provided by the Society or, if insufficient available, 300ml soft drink bottles which will be available on the day of the Show. David Austin Roses (classes 8 and 9) are to be exhibited flat in containers provided by the Society.
- 3. NND means not necessarily distinct (i.e. they may be the same or different cultivars). D means different cultivars or varieties.
- 4. With the exception of Floral Art classes where an exhibitor will be allocated an exhibitor number, every exhibit must be accompanied by a plain white 'business/visitors' card showing the exhibitor's name on one side and, if known, the species or cultivar, together with the Class Number, on the other side. Cards must be displayed with the name of the exhibitor facing down.
- 5. Exhibitors may seek advice of the stewards about the tabling and classification of entries and must respect their decision as final.
- 6. Exhibits may be prepared on tables provided for that purpose but must not be prepared on display tables.
- 7. Exhibitors **must prepare** their own exhibit/s for tabling and **not touch** any exhibit other than their own.
- 8. The Judges' decisions are final.

Rose Specimens - Colin Hollis, The Rose Society of NSW Floral Art - Kim Baillie, President Australian Floral Art Association and Floral Art Demonstrator

NOTE - Exhibitors **must prepare** their own exhibit/s for tabling and **not touch** any exhibit other than their own.

ROSES

Exhibition Roses include hybrid tea and climbing hybrid tea roses with one large flower to a stem with or without disbudding. Exhibition roses must have no side buds.

- 1. One exhibition rose refer guideline 5(iii).
- 2. Three exhibition roses, different cultivars in three containers refer quideline 5(iii)
- 3. One full blown rose refer guideline 5(iv)
- 4. Three full blown roses, different cultivars in three containers refer guideline 5 (iv)
- 5. Four exhibition roses of one cultivar at four stages of development in one container *refer guidelines below*:
 - (i) 1st stage Bud to show colour and petals not starting to unfurl
 - (ii) 2nd stage Midway between first and third stage
 - (iii) 3rd stage Exhibition Stage half to three quarters open
 - (iv) 4th stage Full bloom petals symmetrically arranged within a circular outline, stamens exposed and of good colour, clean and fresh.

Floribunda Roses - modern cluster flowered shrubs or climbing roses.

- 6. One cut the single stem must be visible at the rim of the container.
- 7. Three cuts in one container NND three stems must be visible at the rim of the container.

David Austin Roses

- 8. One cut to be exhibited in container provided.
- Collection of three cuts of different cultivars to be exhibited flat in containers provided.

Modern Shrub Roses

10. One cut— stem must be visible at rim of container.

Miniature Roses - miniature flowered shrubs or climbers which have small flowers with proportionally small foliage. The stems must be thin and wiry. Flowers may be single or double, borne singly or in well-balanced terminal clusters.

11. Collection of three miniature rose/s NND.

Novice Classes for exhibitors who have never won a trophy or a first, second or third prize in the Highlands Garden Society Rose Show.

- 12. One exhibition rose refer guidelines class 5 (iii).
- 13. Three different exhibition roses in three containers refer guidelines class 5 (iii).
- 14. One full blown rose. Refer guideline class 5 (iv)).
- 15. Four exhibition roses of the one cultivar at four stages of development in one container refer guidelines class 5 (i) to (iv).

Sprav

16. A spray of climbing roses to be displayed flat on bench in an orchid tube – not to exceed 50 cm (a limited number of orchid tubes will be available at the Show)

Vase of Roses

- 17.Glass or crystal vase of roses, minimum of 9 blooms NND, side buds and hips allowed. Width not to exceed 30 cm
- 18. Float Bowl of Roses minimum of 3 blooms NND

AUTUMN FLOWERS

- 19 Vase of Hydrangea flowers any stage; minimum of three stems
- 20 Oakleaf Hydrangea flower any stage, one cut
- 21 Vase of mixed grasses
- 22 Vase of salvia NND
- 23 Shallow container of foliage autumn colour allowed minimum of 5 stems or leaves NND. Exhibitor to provide own container
- 24 Mixed vase of autumn flowers featuring geraniums / pelargoniums. Exhibitor to provide own container
- 25 Fuchsia maximum of five cuts NND
- 26 Flower from any bulb, corm or tuber one cut

27 Presentation of home-grown fruit and/or vegetables

Passengers should be fully vaccinated against Covid-19 and may be asked to provide proof prior to boarding the coach.

The National Arboretum in Canberra, created on a 250-hectare (618 acre) site, combines a living collection of



forests with over 44,000 trees from around the world and Australia. It is one of the world's largest living collections of rare, endangered and significant trees surrounding visitors with spectacular views, stunning architecture and the natural beauty of trees and gardens. The site has

been planted since 2005 and was officially opened in February 2013. The award-winning Village Centre is at the heart of the Arboretum. A Gallery of Gardens is being developed with a distinctive story and design and a variety of trees, plants, landscape features and welcoming spaces to enjoy the

inspiring surrounds. Avenues of trees have been planted along the gardens' roads and walkways to create an ever-changing setting across the seasons.

The bonsai pavilion, housing the superb National Bonsai and Penjing Collection of Australia includes native and exotic exhibits which are rotated through the seasons.

A guided coach tour has been arranged for the Arboretum.



A **private garden** in Griffith established by Liz & John Baker on a 970 m² block has a garden area of about 550m². Designed for low maintenance, the garden utilises shrubs, plants and bulbs which could be left for several weeks at a time using pine bark as mulch under all of the trees and shrubs and irrigation with timer-controlled sprinklers. An eclectic collection of sculptures are located throughout the garden including works by established artists and a range of works by students from the ANU's School of Art and Design.

The front garden contains flowering shrubs, perennials, many bulbs and

roses in shades of pink, purple, blue and white. Trees include a *Magnolia x soulangeana*, *Malus ioensis 'Plena'*, and two Crepe Myrtles whilst the small patio area near the front door is a serene space with several sculptures. **The back garden** is defined by paved paths and features several sculptures and raised beds full of hot colours whereas the lower beds are more muted shades. Trees include *Malus floribunda*, *Prunus serrulata 'Prentice Dancer'*, a white Crepe Myrtle '*Natchez'* and the new *Diamonds in the Dark 'Blush'*. Many bulbs have been planted to flower in most seasons and David Austin roses are a favourite. The shady part of the garden has a collection of Hellebores plus



Bergenia and *Camellia sasangua 'Yuletide'* and *'Paradise Vanessa'*. **The vegetable garden** comprises five 2m x 1m raised garden beds about 0.5m high watered by five 180° sprinklers. The area is paved for easy maintenance. Three rotating compost bins serve the vegetable garden
