*I* saw these plants at Bunnings last month and thought 'what an unusual plant'.

Smithatris is a genus of the ginger family (Zingiberaceae). The first


species of this genus, Smithatris supraneanae, was named in 1998 by Kress and Larsen, two researchers from Denmark, in the limestone hills of Saraburi Province, Thailand.



The genus was thought to be monospecific until a second species, Smithatris myanmarensis, was discovered later in Myanmar.

The genus was named after the Scottish botanist Rosemary M. Smith due to her extensive contributions to discoveries and

reclassifications in the *Zingiberaceae* family.

# Gardening in May

During May tidy up the garden – weeding and removing damaged growth. Collect Autumn leaves and add to compost, garden beds and worm farms. For quicker decomposition spread leaves on the lawn first and mow over them.

It's time to dig up and divide bearded iris. Discard the 'mother' rhizome in the middle because it is spent. Replant and dress with a



small amount of slow release rose food.

Last feed before winter for roses, camellias, magnolias and citrus fruit. Order your roses for August planting. There are wonderful new releases this year. Martha Clarke at Welby Garden Centre has a wealth of knowledge to share. She has ordered a huge variety for the rose planting season.

Start preparing your rose beds now for future planting. Enrich your soil with organic matter and cow manure. Test the PH of your soil 5.6 to 6 is highly suitable for roses. If your PH level is low add lime.

It's "Tulip Time" I always plant my tulips around Mother's Day. Turn over the soil



prior to planting until it is fine and crumbly. Raise the beds for planting. Do not apply fertilizer in the bulb hole rather top dress afterwards otherwise new bulb roots will burn. Cover with mushroom mulch. When growing, feed with liquid Sea Mungus.

Choose a Camellia Sasanqua if you want to plant a flowering bush that thrives in the Highlands. Local nurseries have a multitude of flowering specimens to choose from.

The Vegie Patch - Great time for vegie growing. The advantages are many - fewer insect pests, fewer diseases, less need to water and reduced stress on plants. Sow broad beans, peas and spring onions. Plant seedlings: cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, silver beet, Bok and Pak Choy. For a colourful display plant chards – red, yellow and orange stems.



Plant rhubarb crowns. Hopefully your neighbour or friend has a decent clump so they can share a crown or two. They are hungry plants so dig in plenty of wet rotted manure. When planting, water in with seaweed extract – my go to for everything in the garden is Sea Mungus.
