#### Plant of the Month



#### Native - Mint Bush

Mint bush is a native to Australia genus of flowering plants (Prostanthera violacea) of the Lamiaceae family. A small to medium sized dense shrub with highly aromatic foliage releasing a mint essence into the atmosphere. A lavish display of violet flowers throughout spring and early summer attracting butterflies and small insect-eating birds. Traditionally used as a medicinal herb by the Budawang Dhurga language group as a 'rub' to smell and clear sinuses.

# Garden Tips for November - Maryanne Hewitt

Now that we have had such glorious rain, we have snails and aphids!!

Snails - use coffee grounds (see last month's newsletter) OR collect the snails by hand every day; wear gloves; snails are



not clean!! OR wash out a tall tin from the kitchen, place 5 or 6 pellets of snail bait in the tin, put the tin in the garden lying

down and facing away from the direction from which you would hose; secure with a brick or a piece of bent wire - check the tin every few days, the snails will be in the tin - pets cannot get the pellets.

Aphids - hose off – I am told they will not climb up the plant again - OR you could use a spray but BEFORE you do, look carefully for the spotted ladybirds, they are there to eat the aphids. I use the recipe (see last month's newsletter) based on cooking oil - light application needed.

With all the gardens open at the moment and so many beautiful blossoms, I have noticed a couple of Cercis Siliquastrum - the Judas tree - they have a purple/dark pink flower in clusters along the trunk different to many flowering trees; leaves

are dark green, round and 'heart' shaped; the trunk itself has blackish bark, tree grows to about 5m with the canopy about 4m. It is said that this is the tree from which Judas hanged himself after the betrayal of Christ.

Preparing pots for planting - if you are using terracotta or concrete pots, this is a moisture saver!! Make sure the pot is dry and paint at least 2 coats of any old paint left overs around the inside of the pot - IF you don't intend to put the pot mix to the top of the pot then keep the paint level a few cm below the top of the pot if the paint is not to be seen - both concrete and terracotta are porous and a lot of moisture can be lost through the pot.

Recycling tips from Muriel - Takeaway coffee cup. Remove bottom; cover top generously with a layer or two of plastic held on with a rubber band; make a hole in the plastic to allow drainage; place your growing medium in the cup and then the seed/cutting. Care for as usual; when the

plant is ready to put into a larger container or the garden, remove the rubber band and the plastic then the cups contents can be



planted in one go and not disturb the seedling/cutting. Thank you, Muriel!!


