Guest Speaker at the AGM 2018

Charlotte Webb's talk on The Art of Trough Gardening



Trough garden designs look like miniature gardens because they are usually filled with alpine plants, which are often miniature versions of popular perennials and shrubs. They are the perfect low-maintenance, low cost container gardens originally planted in large troughs, old baths and tubs. The Aussie trough was traditionally stone stock water troughs. Most troughs today are small and low profile, therefore great for small spaces. They can fit almost anywhere, placed on a deck or patio, tucked along a walkway or nestled into the garden adding another dimension to the garden. Charlotte spoke on how to create your own trough garden using polystyrene boxes:

Constructing the trough: Firstly, cut box down to size making sure that it has a hole in the bottom for drainage. Cover box using concrete – can become quite heavy, chicken wire, brickies mortar - allow to cure for 2 weeks. Add texture to your box using whatever tool you want, scraping the outside of the box. Paint with Dulux stone paint.

Fill the trough: lay wire mesh or flyscreen in the base of box, add base of perlite or coarse gravel, growing medium – fill to top, mulch.

Planting: give consideration to design. Add some height, give attention to architectural form, add a

feature plant, theme to the trough e.g. colour scheme, plant genus, consideration to plant requirements, don't forget rocks and mosses

Plants to consider: saxifrage, sun plants (small), shade plants, bulbs, Australian natives, succulents

Garden Tips for July Maryann Hewitt

This is the time to start getting your garden ready for spring planting. Remove all weeds, turn soil over roughly and leave for 3 weeks to allow the frost to get into the soil. Next, cover with compost (Curly's) and dig over again. Allow this to settle until you are ready to plant and dig over again, smooth out. It should now be ready for planting spring crops for summer. If you are going to grow tomatoes, now is the time to get some bio mustard seeds into the garden. When they grow to about 30cm (1ft) dig them in. Bio mustard is a soil fumigant and will stop most of the tomato problems. Keep feeding the winter crops that you have—leeks, chives, onions and herbs all like a liquid feed and/or a tonic thru winter. What to plant now depends on the exposure of your garden—very cold; stay with primulas, pansies, violas, and the last of your bulbs, a warmer garden, get some hardy things like Erigeron Karvinskas, poppies, lavenders, (Poppy seeds can still go in) Remember that most of the seedlings that are in Nurseries etc are not grown in a climate such as this and will need some protection for at least 2 weeks after planting. This is also a good time for moving plants as well as tidying those that have grown straggly. Prune fruit trees now (if you usually do winter pruning) and be sure to remove any shoots that are coming from the base of the tree- these are rootstock and will eventually weaken the tree-- Enjoy the frosts !!
